WWCA - General Meeting Minutes - January 15, 2008

The meeting was called to order by president Liz Mills at 7:40 p.m. The December 2007 WWCA meeting minutes were approved. A presentation on interior refining was then given by Laura Heitz of Right Now Redesign.

The treasurer's report was not available. It will be presented at the February meeting. Membership dues are needed.

Liz and Evan Price reported on the Vision Committee's "Art In My Backyard" series. The series will include events of an artistic nature presented by local artists. Liz also reported on the possibility of the LaCosta Theatre sponsoring a theatre night for the community.

Dorie Westmeyer of the Special Events Committee reported that the 2008 Winter Social event would be held at Lexa's on February 23rd and would be thematically similar to the 2007 Winter Social.

Marvin Weinstein reported on a recent Zoning Committee meeting with the alderman and an interested residential developer for the 4024 North Harding parcel. The developer proposes to build 10 townhouses, 4 stories in height on the property and was requesting a zoning change. The proposal was rejected unanimously by the Zoning Committee on the grounds that it is incongruous with the community's Vision.

Liz Mills reported on two fatal shootings recently near the boundaries of WW: One at 4153 Central Park and another on the 3100 block of West Montrose. These incidents are a sober reminder of the need for neighborhood associations to be vigilant in working with the police (via CAPS) to help report crime activity and keep information flowing.

Melanie Reschke reported that there would be a Home Improvement Fair co-sponsored by PEBA on March 9th at St. Edwards. City and local business representatives will be in attendance. There will also be an after-hours networking event on February 25th from 5:00 - 7:00 at the Bulgarian Cultural Center.

The Irving Park Community Food Pantry will be sponsoring a Valentines' Day charity event on February 10th.

In Old Business, it was reported that neighbors still have nuisance issues with odors from the Strip Joynt. Efforts to resolve problems are ongoing with the Alderman's office, City Department of Environment, the Dept. of Planning and neighbors.

CAPS Report

The last few meetings have been sparsely attended, but this month the room was full. Most people were there to find out more about the shooting that occurred in the 4100 block of Central Park on January 12. A lieutenant from the Tactical Unit was there and spoke most of the meeting. While there were no solid leads about the identity of the shooter, the police had some details to share. The victim was a member of the Spanish Gangster Disciples, but lived in territory claimed by the Simon City Royals. The shooter got out of a newer gray or silver car (possibly a Toyota Camry) and there were three other males in the vehicle. He was wearing a red hoodie and was seen several days later, but fled from the police. The police have been focusing their efforts on the area around the clock and hoped to gather more information from possible witnesses to the crime.

Another issue that brought a lot of residents out was the recent rash of dog nappings. A maroon van has been cruising on Monticello between Irving Park and Monticello looking for women walking their dogs. The van stops, knocks down the woman and steals her dog. So far there has not been any progress in locating the van or its owner. Both the police and several people from animal rescue organizations urged people to be alert when walking their dogs, especially at night. Also, when letting your dog out in your yard it is best to stay with them because they can be snatched in a matter of seconds.

One issue from last month was mentioned, the youth who were responsible for the graffiti have been arrested. Unfortunately the crime data that was supplied was from Beat 1732, not 1723. Hopefully next month we can get January's report also and compile both months for the CAPS report.

Growing Vegetables in your Backyard

This month's topic is seed starting, and growing your own vegetables at home. I started growing vegetables last year, and

was fairly successful. I did find the season a bit short though, and starting seeds indoors does not provide enough light – the seedlings get "leggy" - long and weak – even in a sunny window.

So this year I decided to invest in grow lights – they are similar to regular fluorescent lights, and don't use much energy, but provide a good spectrum of light for plant growing. You can also just use regular fluorescents. I bought a heat mat, with its own thermostat, to aid in seed starting, since different seeds like different temperatures.

I always buy heirloom seeds – you can re-sow these year after year from the fruits, as they grow true - rather than hybrids, which are for the season, and which you have to buy every year. Most vegetables you buy in the supermarket are hybrids – if you plant their seeds and something grows, the plant you get may be quite unlike the parent, and may not bear fruit. Most supermarket vegetables are bred for size, color, and ability to handle cold storage, rather than taste. You may know this if you ever ate an heirloom tomato!

Our last frost date is on, or around, April 22nd. Most vegetables need to be started about 6-8 weeks before that, so they can be planted outside as soon as the soil thaws. I've already started some seeds for this year – impatiens and pansies, and the early veggies – peas, cabbage, broccoli, leeks, lettuce, tomatoes – will start first week in March.

Plant the seeds in a good, organic growing medium, let them germinate, thin out if necessary into larger pots, then put them under the lights and let nature do her work. Don't be tempted to over water! Keep soil moist but not wet. Put the seedlings outdoors to "harden off" a few days before planting outside, in a freshly turned bed with compost and mulch, and prepare to enjoy! And get the kids involved – this is a great spring project!

What about bugs? Well, I don't use pesticides – but you can encourage beneficial insects such as ladybugs and mantises that eat caterpillars, or use companion planting, such as nasturtiums under apple trees, which discourages aphids. Also, floating row covers protect your plants, while allowing light and moisture to pass through.


