# Good Food, Great Prices on the Menu at Remix Cafe

WE ARE THRILLED to have a full-scale lunch and dinner restaurant in our neighborhood, within walking distance for many! We enjoyed our first experience at Remix. It's roomy, bright, and will be a great alfresco location during the summer months.

The menu features a good selection of appetizers, soups, salads, paninis, wraps, savory crepes, and entrees. The dessert menu features a large selection of crepes. Prices are very reasonable and range from \$4.95 to \$7.95 for appetizers. Soups/salads range from \$3.50 to \$6.95. Sandwiches are \$6.50 to \$7.95. Crepes range from \$5.35 to \$7.75. Entrees are \$6.50 to \$14.95. Desserts are \$3 to \$4.95.

We had a simple dinner featuring their two signature dishes. The Remix Crepe of ham, chicken, cheese, lettuce, and sour cream sauce was a very generous size and had good flavor. We also had the cevapi, the Serbian version of sausage, served with grilled onions and cheese. An enormous amount of delicious sausage, we brought half home with good intentions of serving it with eggs for breakfast.

The staff is super friendly and committed to making your experience fun and delicious. Remix Cafe has a full bar and decent wines by the glass that are really affordable (most under \$5!). The mixed drinks were also very affordable.

The best recommendation is that it is a family owned restaurant, owned and operated by a neighbor.

# **CAPS Report**

## Specific West Walker Issues Discussed at the January 19 CAPS Meeting for Beat #1723:

Attendees reported continued loud, raucous activity on the 3900 block of Montrose (and surrounding streets) on Saturday nights/Sunday mornings generally during the hours of 1-3 a.m. If you happen to experience such activity, please call 911 and provide as much information as possible.

Tired of graffiti? You can do something about it. Graffiti generally falls in two categories: tagging and gang-related signs and symbols. In order for the police to determine if graffiti is gang-related and a sign of things to come or related to a particular "tagger," they need a photo of the graffiti. Take a photo (camera phone photos acceptable, but do not use any zoom feature as that tends to be blurry) and send it with the address or location of the graffiti and the date and time photo was taken to: CAPS.017district@ chicagopolice.org. If you have a smartphone, include the CAPS email address in your contacts and you'll be able to

make an immediate report. You can also drop off photos at the 17th District Police Station.

In order to have the graffiti removed, call 311 and be able to provide the following information: (1) address or location; (2) is graffiti on the front, side, or rear of building or on a garage; (3) is the graffiti on wood, brick, painted brick, or unknown; and (4) is the graffiti over 6 feet up? Ask for a tracking number. Because of budget cuts, it generally takes three to four days for graffiti to be removed, but if it hasn't been removed in a week, call 311 again and use the tracking number to obtain a status report. Remember, don't assume someone else has reported graffiti. Follow the steps above to make a report.

Parents: Often when a traumatic event involving a child occurs, parents have difficulty thinking clearly and are unable to quickly provide certain information about their child. Or the information may be scattered in different places. The CAPS office has child identification booklets to keep vital information about your child in a single place in the event tragedy strikes. The booklets are for parent use only; nothing is returned to the police or a government office. It compiles information such as contact information of close relatives and friends, fingerprints, hair sample, recent photograph, dental record, physical information such as height, weight, eye color, identifying marks, etc. Because of changes in physical characteristics while a child grows, certain information should be updated annually. If you are interested, stop by the CAPS Office at the 17th District Police Station to pick up child identification booklets.

As announced previously, the CAPS program is in the process of being revamped. At this time, Beat #1723 will continue to have monthly meetings. Other beats may have bimonthly meetings with an opportunity to be heard at other beat meetings. We will monitor the changes to the CAPS Program and report the same. Please continue to attend meetings for Beat #1723 as this may help retain our monthly meetings.

CAPS meetings for 2011 for our beat are currently held at the 17th District Police Station, 4650 N. Pulaski, in the Community Room. Meetings begin at 7 p.m. monthly on the third Wednesday of the month and typically last one hour. The next meeting is Wednesday, February 16.

As always, call 911 to report suspicious activity or individuals in your neighborhood and provide a detailed physical description of the individuals involved in any incident, including clothing, shoes, and vehicle descriptions.



## 39th Ward Report



ARE YOU RECEIVING all of your property tax exemptions? You might be entitled to a refund if you haven't been taking all the exemptions to which you are eligible. My office conducts free one-on-one counseling with property owners to make sure they are receiving all of the tax exemptions they are entitled to. To

date, this has resulted in savings of more than \$300,000 to 39th Ward residents. 

IT CERTAINLY is turning out to be a wild month—momentous events in Egypt, local Chicago elections and ballot issues, and an enormous snowstorm on the way, as I write. By the time you read this, anything could be happening, and probably will be, somewhere in the world.

What can we do when things start to spin out of control? The only thing is to be resilient and have made some basic preparations.

I have no idea whether the snowstorm will knock out power, or keep me indoors for several days, or be unable to get my car out of the garage. But I always have a plan just in case—an indoor propane heater in case the power is out. A Coleman stove for cooking. A few extra groceries in the pantry, including pet food.

I am able to get to any of my jobs via public transit, so as long as the bus or the train are running, I can still work. We are fortunate to have a food market in walking distance. I am fortunate to know neighbors who can help out in an emergency.

Resilience is all about having backup systems. I think about what we would do if something happened to close the Suez Canal, and we find ourselves short of gasoline. We need to be resilient and have a plan "B." We need to make sure we can live, work, and recreate in close proximity, and build close connections to our neighbors.

# News from the Irving Park Community Food Pantry

## **Pantry's Client Total Stabilizes**

The numbers have been tabulated for 2010 at the Irving Park Community Food Pantry, and there was good news and bad news. The total number of households rose slightly in 2010 (from 7,376 in 2009 to 7,502), but the total number of people served actually declined slightly (from 21,417 people to 20,828).

Those totals indicate that a larger number of smaller households and individuals needed our help in 2010. The lower number of individuals who received a three-day supply of food each month is encouraging, but it's daunting to remember that in 2007, just three years ago, the Pantry served 15,042 people, so we're up more than one-third in that time! In December, the Pantry served 780 households with 2,480 people.

**New Board Members:** We've added Gerry Sikora from the Irving Park United Methodist Church and Eleanor Kepp from the Irving Park Lutheran Church as board members.

**Food Drives:** The Pantry is thankful to the large number

The total we receive is based on the size of our donation, with food valued at \$1 per item/pound. It is not a strict matching fund, but it does provide extra funding and we appreciate your help in maximizing our contributions.
