## Dear Neighbor,

SINCE LAST NOVEMBER, we have been involved in two separate, but related, processes here in West Walker. Both will help us focus on what the WWCA organization and the West Walker community will look like in the future.

The first of these processes is the community survey that many took the time to fill out online or in writing. The results of that survey are published on page 15 of the March *Wire*. Although the check-box responses are reported, there were also many narrative responses, too many to publish here, but we will have the time to share them during our WWCA General Meeting on March 15. The survey results will serve as a possible touchstone for changes to the WWCA organization, including the types of meeting we hold and events we sponsor.

The second process has been the evaluation of a proposal for residential development located at 4247-4259 N. Elston Ave. An enormous amount of time and energy was committed to this evaluation. Ultimately, the WWCA Executive Board determined that the project would be appropriate when judged against the West Walker Vision Statement, and a copy of that recommendation, as forwarded to Alderman Laurino, is replicated on page 3 of the March *Wire*. The consideration of this project has created a great interest in how to best direct efforts relating to development in West Walker.

There is a great amount of desire and energy in our community, which, with effort and direction, can be harnessed to build West Walker into the vibrant neighborhood contemplated by the Vision Statement. We will restart the discussion of how to get there at the March meeting. I hope to see you there.

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

Dear Alderman Laurino:

The Zoning Committee of the West Walker Civic Association has recently considered a proposal to change the zoning from C-1-1 to B-2-2 on property located at 4247-4259 N. Elston Ave for the construction of six three-unit residential dwellings. In addition, the developers of the proposed project presented renderings and plans for the project at a special WWCA meeting on November 16, 2010. Since that time, we have solicited input from all community members, including those who were unable to attend the November presentation.

By a substantial margin, community response favors the proposed residential construction. More importantly, when judged against the goals embraced by the WWCA Vision Statement, the Zoning Committee has determined that the proposed construction fulfills the goals of the Vision Statement for residential development as one factor in the overall development of Elston Avenue and the West Walker Community as a whole.

The Executive Board of the WWCA has considered the recommendations of the Zoning Committee and feedback from the community, and had also independently reviewed the project in light of the goals set forth by the WWCA Vision Statement. After careful consideration, the Executive Board has voted to recommend that approval of the proposed zoning change be granted, subject to final design approval and covenants.

For certain complaints (such as loud noise, panhandlers, and aggressive people), the police often need to see an activity to make an arrest or take other action. In such cases, reporting the activity at a CAPS meeting or making a community concern report through ClearPath is not as helpful in resolving the issue as calling 911. So, in addition to registering such a complaint at a CAPS meeting or through a community concern report, a person seeing and wishing to report such activity should call 911 at the time the activity is occurring, so the police can respond, see the activity, and take appropriate action.

There was an uptick of graffiti and tagging in the days following the snowstorm in early February, and removal of graffiti is taking longer than in the past. Please continue to report graffiti to: (1) 311 for graffiti removal (don't forget to ask for a tracking number so you can call back to get a status report if the removal is not completed) and (2) the 17th District (CAPS.017district@ chicagopolice.org) by sending a photo of the graffiti along with the address or location so the graffiti can be logged in its database.

The Town Hall Meeting on March 23 replaces our regular beat meeting in March. With that exception, CAPS meetings for our beat are currently held monthly at the 17th District Police Station, 4650 N. Pulaski, in the Community Room. Meetings begin at 7 p.m. on the third Wednesday of the month and typically last one hour. The next regularly scheduled meeting for Beat 1723 is Wednesday, April 20.

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
#### News from the Irving Park Community Food Pantry

#### Pantry to Survey Community

The Irving Park Community Food Pantry will soon be distributing a community survey to our neighborhood organizations and residents to be used to expand our services to our clients and for strategic planning. The survey, to be distributed via e-mail by Survey Monkey, will solicit feedback from churches, schools, community organizations, and businesses.

The survey will be combined with a client survey conducted in February to identify specific client needs and concerns. The information from these two surveys will be put toward our Enhanced Client Services Initiative, which is being coordinated by Client Resources Coordinator Belma Torres.

**Be a Bunny for Pantry Children:** The youth of Irving Park United Methodist Church create Easter Bags for approximately 250 young clients of the Irving Park Community Food Pantry in these age categories: Under 2, 2 to 5 years, and 6 to 8 years old. The distributions will take place this year on April 6, 13, and 20.





The Irving Park Community Food Pantry's Easter-basket distribution makes for a happy Easter for about 250 young Pantry clients.

The gift bags include Easter grass and layers of safe, fun, and useful things that can be found easily in a \$1 store: toys, crayons, stuffed animals, etc. Typically about 75 bags are given out each week.

Donations can be dropped off during regular business hours at the Irving Park United Methodist Church at Grace and Keeler (Grace Street entrance). Financial donations can be sent by mail or through Google checkout at the Pantry's website (www.irvingparkfoodpantry.org).

**Augment Your Donation:** During March and April, contributions to the Pantry are supplemented by funds from the Feinstein Challenge, a \$1-million fund operated by Alan Shawn Feinstein to aid hunger organizations nationwide. The total we receive is based on the size of the donation, with food donations valued at \$1 per item/ pound. It is not a strict matching fund, but it does provide extra funding, usually several hundred dollars, and we appreciate your help in maximizing our contributions.

### **It's Seed Starting Time**

HERE WE ARE AGAIN, at the end of February. It's turned out to be a record month for snowfall—the most in February since 1896. Of course, this is a predictable result of a warming atmosphere, where more moisture collects and, therefore, we have greater precipitation.

We should prepare for a pretty active spring and summer season—lots of thunderstorms. Visit the NOAA website for more information: www.crh.noaa.gov/lot/

Meanwhile, I am already preparing for this year's planting season. One thing I have been working on is extending my growing season. Some vegetables, such as spinach, chard, carrots, and lettuce, can be started before last frost, approximately April 20. Seeds can be planted directly outside, in a protected area, six weeks before last frost.

Access to a small greenhouse or hoophouse can be helpful, as well as using a "cloche," essentially a plant cover to keep warmer air around the plant.

One can also construct a cold frame. This is essentially a raised bed covered by clear plastic or glass, which acts like a greenhouse to warm early plants on a sunny day and help to retain the warmer air. Don't forget to mulch well, to retain moisture during dry spells.

THIS YEAR PROMISES to be an outstanding year for the Irving Park Garden Club. We will be doing the traditional




things like having informative guest speakers and hands-on demonstrations. We also have two field trips planned, one in early spring to Sunrise Garden Center, and we're
