Minutes for April meeting were approved. Current balance was \$4,933.46 with Blue Print printing bill for the last several issues of the wire at \$1535. The current balance in the West Walker account is \$3483.46. Note: The banner account and WWCA accounts have been merged into this account.

Reid Johnson and Jean Scott of the 4100 block of Ridgeway would like to decrease the flow of non-resident traffic in the alley running between 4200 N Hamlin and Ridgeway Avenues as it encourages criminal and gang activity, public urination, and poses threats to residents ans well as to health and sanitation. Mr. Johnson and Ms. Scott currently have a petition and are in conversation with Alderman Laurino's office for some solutions. 

CAPS meetings for our beat are currently held monthly at the 17th District Police Station, 4650 N. Pulaski, in the Community Room. Meetings begin at 7 p.m. on the third Wednesday of the month and typically last one hour. The next regularly scheduled meeting for Beat 1723 is Wednesday, June 15. As always, call 911 to report suspicious activity or individuals in your neighborhood and provide a detailed physical description of the individuals involved in any incident, including clothing, shoes and vehicle descriptions. For incidents which are no longer in progress, remember that rather than calling 911, you may call 311 to have a police officer complete a report for incidents such as theft, criminal damage to property, lost property and other non-emergency situations.

News from the Irving Park Community Food Pantry

Come Walk with the Pantry on June 25th!

Help the Irving Park Community Food Pantry raise funds that will help feed those in our community in need all year, You can aid our efforts by donating or walking with us in the 26th Annual Hunger Walk on Saturday, June 25, 2011 at Soldier Field. Registration begins at 7 a.m. and walkers step off at 8:15 a.m.

Last year's walk raised the most money ever, with donations up nearly 50%. Even so, our contributions for the year were down, as many people are stretched thin by the economy and are no longer able to help their neighbors as much. That makes it even more important that the walk is as successful as possible.

Please know that 100% of your contributions are used to procure food to help your neighbors, which we purchase from the Greater Chicago Food Depository at 7¢ per pound. So your donations go a long way toward helping us feed our neighbors!

The event consists of a 5K (3.2-mile) walk along the lakefront. It features entertainment for the entire family, including special guests, music and activities. All walkers receive a goody bag, snacks and a t-shirt. Participants don't even have to walk the route as long as they are present!

You can support the Hunger Walk in three ways:

- 1. Organize a Hunger Walk Team of at least 10 walkers, with the Irving Park Community Food Pantry designated as the recipient agency. Each walker signs up pledges to sponsor their walk. To learn more, visit www.irvingparkfoodpantry.org or contact Lee Stein at volunteer@irvingparkfoodpantry.org.

- 3. Donate to a Hunger Walk Team. Sign a walker's pledge sheet or donate by check or online at the Hunger Walk site (listed in #2). Please indicate the money is designated for the "Irving Park Community Food Pantry, Agency #A00113." Matching grants are available for money donated by July 31st, so please send your contribution as soon as possible.





What do Shaquille O'Neil, Sting, Lady Gaga, Michelle Obama, the Chicago Cubs and Gumby all have in common? Yes, you guessed it, they all do YOGA! The word Yoga comes from the Sanskrit word "Yuj" meaning to yoke or unite. Yoga joins the body and mind through breath and is truly for everyone, from ages 2 to 102. Yoga is adaptable for all body types and includes mindful breathing, simple standing and seated poses, and concludes with guided relaxation.

Yoga meets you where you are and helps you become more flexible. As Americans, it can be tough for us to slow down, be patient and wait for our muscles to cooperate. It is recommended that people commit to 4-6 weeks of a yoga program before evaluating themselves or their progress. Strength, flexibility, and balance will increase, sleep and concentration improve, and body weight will maintain or drop.

Yoga has a strong mind-body connection. A new study shows that folks who do yoga 3x's/week have consistent drops in the stress hormone (cortisol) and big increases of melatonin and gaba--relaxation and sleep agents. (Note, people who walked for exercise saw no change.) So take time to practice yoga. Your body, mind, family and friends will thank you.



News from Hands to Help

Nothing Trivial about your generosity!

Many thanks to everyone who made the Hands to Help Trivia Night a great success! Thanks to all of you who bought tickets and donated to the cause, we raised \$4,200 to help our neighbors who are homeless or in danger of becoming homeless. Thanks to Sears for donating a flat screen T.V., Nissan for the detailing and oil change gift certificate, Sabatino's for the box of wine and a gift certificate, and The Bank of America for donating the space and the bank staff who volunteered

their time to come and clean up! Food was provided by Six Corners Association, Irving Park United Methodist, St. John's Episcopal Church, and St. Viator's Parish.

Where will that money go?

In 2010, Hands to Help assisted 132 individuals or families. From January to April 2011 we have assisted 51 clients. 65% of our clients are individuals, and 35% are families. We have moved 3 individuals/families from being homeless to permanent housing and we have prevented homelessness through retention of housing or new housing for 14 individuals/families, providing a total of \$3,235 in rental assistance. The other 34 individuals/families were assisted with \$383.45 for utilities, \$584.75 for transportation \$71.99 for medical, \$330 for food, and \$290 in other assistance such as new identification.

Who are we serving? Why do we help them?

Hands to Help Clients are 47% female and 53% male, ranging from ages 18 to 66 years old. Of the people we've helped, 29% had no income when we met them; 27% make \$1-500 per month; 35% make \$501-1000; and 2% have income of \$1001-2000. All our clients live in the 60641 or 60618 area. Thank you for making a difference in our neighbor's lives!


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
