What's next? Well, for one we have a new head to our efforts on behalf of the Chicago Park District,



Brendan Daley. Daley is Executive Assistant for Greening Initiatives and is a bungalow owner himself. He has great passion for this new assignment. Most recently, Daley has been instrumental in securing a grant from the Chicago's Dept. of Environment. This grant has a specific use: to install a geo-thermal heating and cooling system in the bungalow.

Under Daley's direction, an RFP went out to architects and more than 50 have responded with interest. The pro-bono work done by Earth Tech late last year was key to the plan laid forth by the Park District. Earth Tech laid much of the groundwork for the design, conception, and scope of the project.


#### **Green Energy**

I hope you had a great summer! I did, and my garden has been doing great this year! For my first column this fall though - I want to talk about Green Energy.

We have seen the price of gasoline go up dramatically, as I said it would on the West Walker forum last year. The main reason for this is that oil is priced on a global market, and world demand has continued to increase, while supply has lagged behind.

Of course, there are other factors, but the main thing to realize is that oil is a finite, non-renewable resource. We have already taken out most of the easy, cheap oil, and are now having to look farther out, in deeper water, in very technically challenging areas at high risk from hurricane activity and other intense weather events. That



will, of course, just cost us more. Prices have only receded the last few weeks because a global economic slowdown has reduced pressure on demand.

We also know that burning oil (fossil fuel) causes Global Warming pollution, by releasing Carbon Dioxide into the atmosphere. It seems to me that we should start to seriously focus on alternative, green energy. We need Solar, Wind, Geothermal and Hydro power, all renewable resources. We need this urgently, and need to be pushing our elected officials to move fast on this issue.

With Fall approaching, I would suggest to everyone to think about home insulation and weatherization, as natural gas prices, which often follow oil prices, are expected to be higher this year.

Proposals from the architectural firms are due back to the Chicago Park District by August 29. A committee from the Park District will review the proposals during September and October, and the architectural firm that is awarded the contract will be notified in early November.

The current project schedule includes several community meetings to review the plans. These meeting will be announced in the West Walker Wire, GIPNA's newsletter, The Voice and via e-mail.

Now we must focus on fundraising. Historic preservation consultant Emily Ramsey has agreed to head up the grant writing aspect of our efforts, and we are looking for volunteers interested in assisting her. We have the names of many grant opportunities but these all take time. The annual Fine Wine & Cheese Party is scheduled for November 8. We are looking for silent auction items, as well as wine and cheese donations for this event. All of the proceeds from the Fine Wine & Cheese Party go directly to our renovation project.



### Hot Nights, Cool Food A Review on Hot Woks Cool Sushi

When you hear the word Sushi you either cringe or your mouth starts to water (like mine). Add a wok and you'll confuse most culinary characters, but you have a grand concept. Take this concept and move it into an area starving (pun fully intended) for great eateries and you'll have what could be a highly successful restaurant – Hot Woks Cool Sushi.

After six straight weeks of intense research there can be only one conclusion... (if you have to ask you need to get out more; no one eats bad sushi for six weeks). The food is phenomenal! OK, phenomenal is a very strong word. But after living San Francisco and traveling the US, it's hard to find good sushi unless you are by a large body of salt water. In the Mid-West there aren't too may places, except Chicago, where you can find decent sushi, let alone great sushi.

On my first reconnaissance mission I went in with an empty stomach, a want for sushi, and a nose for fishiness. When I walked in, my nose told me the fist story; no fishy smell! This is vitally important to any type of sushi house, or fish monger. When is comes to fish there is only one commandment: THOU SHALL NEVER SMELL FISH IN A FISH PLACE. After my nose told me it was OK to enter, I was greeted by several of the wait staff who were warm and pleasant. I quickly grabbed a take out menu and perused it till I found what I needed. My choices of a Rainbow Roll (Cucumber, Avocado, Crab Meat inside and layered with Tuna, salmon, Yellowtail, and Masago) and a Caterpillar Roll (Cooked eel, Cucumber, Avocado, and red and black Tobikko). This is a good test to see how fresh the fish is.

I began talking to the person who took my order (Noom, I think is how you spell it, sorry if it's wrong) who is one of the three partners in the restaurant. His first question to me was how did I hear about the place, and do I normally go for sushi? I told him I live in the neighborhood. As for where I go for sushi, I mentioned Bob-San (Division by Ashland). His eyes opened wide and he said he worked with Bob. Major points were gained there.

When I received my package of goodness, I sped home to dig into my culinary research. (Ok, fine, I really went home to stuff my face). I was impressed, the fish was very fresh, and the artistry (sushi is edible art) was well done. So they passed the first tests. Next it would be the "sit down" test. My wife and I would go for a sit-down meal.

As we walked in Noom recognized me (always a great feeling) and waved. The person at the front welcomed us, and got us seated quickly. We looked over the Hot Woks portion of the menu and were very impressed with the mix of Asian standards. There are Japanese Yakisoba Noodles, Pad Thai, and Mongolian Noodles. Not to mention Thai Rama Chicken (my wife's favorite), Chinese Fried Rice, and Mandarin Chicken.

We ordered the Pad Thai, Sushi Gold (8 pieces of sushi, with a California or Spicy Tuna Roll; I had the Spicy Tuna Roll) and 3 additional rolls: Spider, Fukudome and Spicy Scallop Roll. That order gave us a great cross section of the restaurants offerings.

Hot Woks Cool Sushi is BYOB (\$3 corking fee), so we brought a bottle of wine to enjoy. After our server uncorked the bottle, the person who met us at the door brought our glasses and to see how we were doing. She happened to be one of the other partners, Laura (the third partner being her husband David). We got to talking, shared our bottle of wine with Laura much to David's chagrin, and found out a wealth of information. We spoke for sometime until our food came, which was fairly fast, and we began digging in.

Again, I have to say it - phenomenal! The Fukudome Roll was outstanding (Shrimp Tempura, Mayo, Masago, Avocado, Chile Sauce, red Tobiko, Cream Cheese, Scallion with Tempura crumbs on the outside and topped with Wasabi Mayo and Sweet and Sour Sauce). The Spicy Tuna and Scallop Roll, taste wise, were on the mark for me. Great blend of texture and heat. The Spider Roll was the only thing that held it from being a home run. It was different from all the other Spider Rolls I've had. I think there was hint or basil or other herb that threw off the flavor. Not saying it was bad, just not what I expected. Something I'll need to try again to make sure it wasn't a one time fluke.

Then we dug into the Pad Thai; and we were back in heaven. The texture, flavor combinations, and smell all added up to a marriage of an amazing dish. This is a true winner.

While we have been back an additional four straight weeks, everything we've had (Rama Chicken, Hot Woks Noodles, Tempura Beef, and several additional rolls) everything is just great. I would highly recommend Hot Woks Cool Sushi to my most discriminating sushi fanatics, and have.

### June CAPS Report

The following issues were covered from the last meeting:

 The homeless people who have been occupying a few vacant buildings on Central Park are still taking up residence. There has not been any progress with the city regarding the request for the building to be boarded up.

#### New issues raised:

- There were several complaints about another neighborhood ice cream truck cruising the area and reportedly selling drugs from the truck. The officers keep an eye out for the green ice cream truck that was identified as the culprit.
- Quite a few cars have been broken into in the 4200 block of Monticello. Officers plan to do a safety belt check as a way to establish a police presence in the neighborhood.
- As of the June meeting no sergeant had been assigned to CAPS. Many residents expressed their concern and stressed the need for a permanent CAPS leader that the community can build a relationship with. The officers present promised to bring the matter to the attention of the 17th district commander.
- Gang graffiti continues to be problem in our neighborhood, but no immediate solution was discussed.

# Office Report: 39th Ward

I am pleased to inform you that the West Walker community will be benefiting from some significant infrastructure improvements, in the coming weeks and months, as part of the 2008 Capital Improvement program. Most of this work will be completed by the Chicago Department of Transportation (CDOT).

As we all know, the rough Chicago winter left us with large potholes all over the city, but Ridgeway Avenue, between Montrose and Elston, seems to have been impacted more than most. Consequently, this three block stretch is scheduled for Street Resurfacing this fall.



CDOT crews will also be resurfacing the alley, bordering Elston, Irving Park, Hamlin and Ridgeway, behind the Garden Center. Additionally, there will be some Curb and Gutter replacement on the east side of Hamlin, between Elston and Belle Plaine, to alleviate the standing water concerns.

As you have probably noticed, the Department of Water Management has begun a few very large sewer projects in the area. A new sewer will be placed in Avers Avenue (Berteau to Montrose), Hamlin Avenue (Montrose to Windsor), Windsor Avenue (Hamlin, east to the dead end) and Montrose Avenue (Pulaski to Central Park). These sewer improvements will have a substantial impact on the entire neighborhood and hopefully prevent another flooding incident like the one we experienced last summer.

I would like to take this opportunity to give a heartfelt "Thank You" to West Walker residents who circulated and signed our blue cart petitions. Resident, Michelle Kaicener, is to be especially commended for her service on the 39th Ward Blue Cart Committee. This group of volunteers from neighborhoods across the 39th Ward came together to create awareness of the blue cart recycling program and to petition the city to bring the program to our ward. Michelle volunteered countless hours to organizing a blue cart awareness campaign, a petition drive, and an elementary school drawing contest. She also attended the Mayor's Budget Hearing in August where she testified about the great enthusiasm residents of the 39th Ward have for recycling. I have no doubt that because of all the hard work of Michelle, the Blue Cart Committee, and our 39th Ward Community Organizations, we are one step closer to being a blue cart ward.

Finally, together with Secretary of State Jesse White and State Representative John D'Amico, I am sponsoring a **State ID Program** on **Wednesday, September 17 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.** in the 39th Ward Service Office,

4404 W. Lawrence. Staff from the Secretary of State's Mobile Unit will be in the office to renew driver's licenses (vision and written testing available), and sell state ID cards (free for seniors, \$20 for those under 65) and vehicle license plate stickers.


