AIMBY Launches Mortal

Art In My Back Yard is pleased to present *Mortal*, the group's second presentation of visual art in the artistic series. Located across the street from a funeral parlor, *Mortal* is an exhibition of work by three artists who contemplate death and rebirth. The show of painting, ceramics and sculpture by **Mel Dean Westmeyer**, **Chris Busse** and **David Dumo** offer both sober and playful takes on the theme of mortality.

The exhibition begins November 14th and runs through Sunday, December 7. AIMBY will hold a series of events at the gallery during the month-long show, including an artist talk on Saturday, Nov 22, 4-5 p.m.; a kids' art workshop on Sunday, November 30, 1-2:30 p.m., and a networking forum for artists on Saturday, December 6, 4-6 p.m.

The gallery is located at 3959 W. Irving Park Road. Gallery hours are Fridays, 2-6 p.m.; Saturdays, 2-6 p.m.; and Sundays, 12-4 p.m.

Mortal is part of a series of exhibitions presented by Art In My Back Yard (AIMBY), an art program that uses empty neighborhood storefronts on the northwest side of Chicago to feature the work of community artists. Its name plays off the phrase "Not In My Back Yard," or "NIMBY" and refers to an effort to encourage people in the community to support and learn about art and local artists. AIMBY was founded by West Walker Civic Association in 2007.

<u>Dear Neighbor:</u>

Election Day this year was as fine a November day as I can remember. That seemed fitting. After almost 2 years of listening to the candidates and the work mates and the friends and family debate, it was time to decide to move forward. My boys are 8 and 11 years old, but they were almost as well versed in the popular pros and cons of the candidates, at least in the Presidential race, as the average man in the street. They were up early, knowing we had to vote early before school and work. Normally when we arrive at our polling place (The Latvian Center) before 7:00 a.m., we are almost alone and are one of the first 20 people to vote that day.

This Tuesday, we were greeted by a line almost out the door. I think everyone was surprised at the crowd, but everyone was patient, happy and respectful. People could tell it was going to be a special day. People were ready to put the debate behind and move forward.

I, like many I know, had hopes that this day would be one that would be remembered not just by us, but by future generations. I was also lucky enough to bring my family to join sixty thousand other people in Grant Park that night to wait for the results of this historic campaign and election.

The streets surrounding Grant Park were full of a wonderful energy. Like the circus had come to town or at Carnival. But the performers were us, the jubilant, hopeful people from all walks of life who, more than anything else, just wanted to be there. To be embraced by the thousands of other hopefuls who felt that a new time was at hand.

And I wanted my children to be there too. This election was about their future more than our past. If this country was going to shrug off the old and embrace the future, I wanted them to remember that they were there when it all began.

After enjoying the street, we entered the field where the stage sat, waiting for its speaker to arrive. The crowd was noisy in anticipation and rose up in excitement every time a new state was called. Barack Obama's name was on everyone's lips. When the announcement came that Obama was over the top, there was an explosion of cheers, tears and hugging, amazement and joy.

We could just see the stage from our rise of the ground. My little one, Charlie, had curled at my feet in the warm leaves. The older, Max, was standing in rapt attention when our President–elect, Barack Obama, waiting out the cheers, gave his acceptance speech by beginning:

"If there is anyone out there who still doubts that America is a place where all things are possible; who still wonders if the dream of our founders is alive in our time; who still questions the power of our democracy, tonight is your answer."

As we stood and listened, I thought of my children and how much this election could mean to them, this country and the world. Obama's words mingled with my thoughts. It will be a difficult task ahead. I will do what I can. I will encourage my children, and others, to do what's right and what will make the future a better place. Although I am a cynic at times, this is not one.

The words from the stage come back to me:

"This is our time - to put our people back to work and open doors of opportunity for our kids; to restore prosperity and promote the cause of peace; to reclaim the American Dream and reaffirm that fundamental truth - that out of many, we are one; that while we breathe, we hope, and where we are met with cynicism, and doubt, and those who tell us that we can't, we will respond with that timeless creed that sums up the spirit of a people:

Yes We Can.

Thank you, God bless you, and may God Bless the United States of America."

America has shown how great it can be this month. We are all neighbors, be it the family next door, across town or in another country. This is the message I will teach my children. This is the message they heard one warm November night in Grant Park. This is the message I hope everyone can hold and pass on.

WWCA - General Meeting Minutes - October 21, 2008

Mike Weber opened the meeting at 7:40 and introduced the 17th District's new Police Commander, Michael Mealer.

Commander Mealer spoke with us at length. Commander Mealer grew up across from Bateman School, attended Lane Tech and North Park College and is also an attorney.

Commander Mealer is glad to see the neighborhood has remained relatively stable and seems to be changing for the better. He would like to reduce juvenile crimes and has met with local principals and the police officers in the schools. Other than thefts to vehicles, he noted no significant crime worries for our area. GPS systems and other electronics should be removed from vehicles or kept out of sight.

The 17th district is the 3rd largest in the city and its boundaries are from the river to Cicero and from Belmont to Devon, encompassing approximately 170,000. Commander Mealer also said that we can go to www. chicagopolice.org and submit questions and issues regarding our community.

The treasurer's report showed an amount of \$963.07. Motion to approve the report was made by Liz Mills and seconded by Mark Pascale.

There are many upcoming special events – including Art In My BackYard which begins on Friday, 11/14 and will be at 3959 W Pulaski.

More carriers are needed to deliver the wire. Interested? Contact a West Walker Board Member.

There will be no November meeting. Meetings for this membership year are September, October, December, March, April and May. The West Walker Wire will continue to be published in the months when there are no meetings – November, January, February and June.

The meeting adjourned at 8:45PM.

Green Committee Update

Hi everyone, There are three neighborhood topics I want to talk about in this issue:

1. Mayor Daley's Winter Preparedness Fairs

Mayor Daley and the City of Chicago are, once again, holding winter preparedness fairs in various locations around the city. The one closest to West Walker will be at:

Roosevelt High School, 3436 W. Wilson Ave., Tuesday, November 18th, 2008, 3:30 p.m. – 8:00 p.m.

You will receive a free home weatherization kit, which, last year, contained weather stripping, plastic window covering, outlet covers, CFL's (compact fluorescent light bulbs), all in a great tote bag that can be reused for shopping! For a full list of locations, or for more information about saving on utility bills, or utility assistance, go to http://egov.cityofchicago.org/city/webportal/home.do or call 311.

2. New Recycling Dropoff Center

We have a new location to recycle our paper, bottles, and cans in the 39th Ward. The City of Chicago has placed a blue recycling bin in the public parking lot of the 17th District Police Station, 4651 N. Pulaski. Residents can drop off:

- Aluminum, tin or steel cans
- Flattened cardboard boxes, cereal boxes, paper towel rolls
- Glass jars and bottles
- Plastic bottles and containers
- Newspaper, magazines, catalogs, office paper, telephone books

Recyclables do not need to be separated. The drop-off center is open from dawn to dusk, 7 days a week.

3. Discussion about starting a West Walker Community Garden

I will mention this very briefly since it is just an idea, and very much on the drawing board, but if anyone would be interested in participating in a Community Garden, please contact me and let me know.




















Office Report: 39th Ward

Michelle Kaicener and members of the West Walker Civic Association were instrumental in getting signatures for the 39th Ward blue cart petition drive. We're still hoping to get the blue carts next year but in the meanwhile, the Department of Streets and Sanitation installed a blue recycling bin in the public parking lot of the **17th District Police Station**, **4651 N. Pulaski**.

Residents can drop off the following in the recycling bin:

- · Glass jars and bottles
- · Aluminum, tin or steel cans
- Flattened cardboard boxes, cereal boxes, paper towel rolls
- Plastic bottles and containers
- Newspaper, magazines, catalogs, office paper, telephone books

Recyclables do not need to be bagged or separated. The drop-off center is open from dawn to dusk, 7 days a week.

Trying to save a little on your utilities this winter? Then stop by Mayor Daley's Winter Preparedness Fair on Tuesday, November 18, from 3:30 – 8 p.m., at Roosevelt High School, 3436 W. Wilson. The fair is designed to help Chicago residents prepare for the winter, with services ranging from applying for financial assistance to learning about Peoples Gas and Com Ed budget payment programs. In addition, everyone who attends the fair will receive a free home weatherization kit.

Foreclosures are increasing throughout the country and Chicago is no exception. If you or someone you know has difficulty meeting mortgage payments, the City of Chicago is sponsoring a series of Borrower Outreach days. The event offers participants loan work-out sessions with counselors and lenders, access to free legal assistance, various workshops and information about the City's financial literacy programs. The northwest Borrower Outreach Day will be held on Saturday, December 6, at North Park Village, Administration Building, 5801 N. Pulaski, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. To register, please contact the Department of Housing at 312-742-0635.

Curriculum Mapping

St. Viator recently received a grant to implement a new program: Curriculum Mapper. Information gathered from this mapping will allow for an on-going professional discussion on how to continually improve the education provided to students. The data generated from the system can be analyzed to make sure there is alignment within St. Viator to create a seamless preschool through 8th grade journey. The data can also be examined in conjunction with standardized test scores to pinpoint areas of strengths and weaknesses to continually improve the education provided to St. Viator students. The Curriculum Mapper provided by Collaborative Learning Inc. is implemented by the Archdiocese of Chicago in conjunction with the Office of Catholic Schools.


