Reflective of the amazing diversity that is Chicago, the students hail from the north, south, and west sides of the city and represent the full spectrum in regards to race, ethnicity and socioeconomic backgrounds. The school will add a grade each year to grow to full enrollment as a K-8 campus, serving approximately 500 students.

WWCA – General Meeting Minutes – November 20, 2007 – 14 present

WWCA Vice-President Evan Price opened the meeting at 7:35 p.m.

The October General Meeting Minutes were approved, as amended.

Treasurer Bob Begeske reported a general account balance of \$1,872.10.

Martha Maldanado of Lexa's Creative Floral Design at 4433 N Elston was on hand to show many plants and flowers which could be used for Holiday and other occasions. She was assisted by her daughter and the Shop's namesake, Lexa. Martha demonstrated ideas for arrangements that could last up to 3 months with certain tropical fronds. Martha is available for consultation for design six days a week at 773-205-2107.

Evan Price reported The Artistic Series, a varied series of artistic events, is planning to announce events starting in early 2008. Plans include a curated Art exhibit, Author reading and music events. These events will take place as the search for a West Walker Cultural Anchor continues.

Grants were announced by the American Express and The National Trust for Historic Preservation "Partners in Preservation." The Independence Park Bungalow did not receive enough votes to receive a major grant, but still qualified for a \$5,000 grant.

In addition, the Fine Wine and Cheese event at the Independence Park Bungalow was a success and raised \$9,000 for renovation.

The Stripp Joynt, located at 4170 North Elston, has been cleared to reopen by the City of Chicago Department of the Environment. The business will be subjected to ongoing review and any problems noticed by neighbors should be reported.

The Car Wash at Elston and Harding appears to be operating with the proper zoning and permits.

Michelle Kaicener is coordinating recycling efforts. This includes a hopeful bid to have the neighborhood be first in line for the next expansion of the Blue Cart recycling program. In addition, Jack Prikos at the farmer's Market will be carrying many more organic items next Spring for those truly Green of thumb. A recycling Committee is being formed and those interested in more information should contact Michelle.

A new Wire Coordinator, whose primary responsibility is to ensure delivery of the Wire to all carriers, is needed. Anyone interested should approach any WWCA Board Officer or Board Member.

The meeting was adjourned by Vice-President, Evan Price.

This is the time of year when all thoughts turn to home heating. And with the price of a barrel of oil almost at \$100, who knows where gasoline will be priced next year ?

So let's look at a few ways to save on the gasoline, home heating and electricity bills, and help the environment at the same time !

 Turn off lights and appliances when not in use. Put appliances e.g. computers on a power strip and turn it off or unplug it when not in use. Many appliances keep using electricity (standby mode) even when turned off.

- 2. Turn down your water heater thermostat and buy a water heater blanket
- Do only full loads of laundry and wash dishes by hand, or if you must use the dishwasher, run it only when full, and use low energy settings.
- 4. Close curtains at night, and open them on a sunny day to let the sun heat the room. Thermal drapes help too.
- 5. Walk, ride a bike, carpool or take transit, instead of getting in the car alone. Where possible, shop local !
- 6. Turn down that heating thermostat 65 degrees is fine. Throw on a sweater instead ! (I have mine at 62 during the day and 55 at night). Programmable thermostats are great! Why heat the house fully if you aren't at home?
- 7. Insulate those leaks, especially around doors and windows. Put insulation in the attic, around ductwork, and seal other leaky areas such as around outlets.
- If you are seeking new appliances, look for the Energy Star label. Don't buy the biggest model on the showroom floor – buy the one which best meets your needs and is most efficient ! Top freezers, kept full, are most efficient.
- Use LED lights or compact fluorescents rather than incandescent bulbs. Holiday lights are available in LED's. They may be a bit more expensive, but they last much longer and use less energy.

 When driving, accelerate slowly, decelerate slowly and moderate your speed. This saves gasoline. Keep the correct tire pressure and the engine properly tuned.

The city is holding 12 Winter Preparedness fairs at various locations around the city. The one closest to West Walker will be held on Saturday January 12th, 2008 at North Park Village, 5801 N Pulaski, 9am – 2pm.

You can pick up a home weatherizing kit, including compact fluorescent light bulbs. Peoples Gas and ComEd will be there to discuss energy saving tips and budget payment programs.

I have a lot more tips in a pdf file – email me and I'll send it to you.



nurture our children by fostering a safe and positive environment that is conducive of all children receiving a high quality college preparatory education. Each child will develop the confidence and academic skills to grow academically, socially, intellectually and morally into Life-Long Learners. The pioneering spirit in the teachers, students and families has brought the Irving Park mission to life.

Academic rigor coupled with the power of diversity make CICS-Irving Park a gem amongst the charter, public and private schools. Data-driven decision making is the key to promoting high academic achievement. The teachers are provided with training and resources to effectively use assessments to drive their instruction. In kindergarten through 2nd grade DIBELS is used to measure growth. NWEA assessments are used to guide individualized instruction in the 3rd and 4th grades. This system fosters a real culture of collaboration among the teachers at CICS- Irving Park.

At CICS-Irving Park parents have been an integral part of the school from the very beginning. Prior to the school's opening, a parent launch committee assisted with aspects of development and start-up. My family recently had the opportunity to experience a new neighborhood dining option called Curio Cafe. At the northwest corner of Roscoe and Lawndale, the Curio Cafe is not exactly "next door" distance from West Walker, but you sure don't have to schlep to Lakeview or Lincoln Square either.

A cozy little corner storefront place, the Curio is perfect for those of us with little ones. Exceptionally kid friendly, it has a small height table for about 6 kids with toys and a huge chalkboard. All the kids in the place just gravitate to it and OCCUPY THEMSELVES!!! My wife and I had an opportunity to have a really nice quiet brunch while the Dynamic Duo (our 2 and 3 year old boys) did "their thing".

The food was terrific. Latin flare type omelets with whatever you can dream up to put in them...organically oriented, fair trade coffee, etc. The oatmeal & fruit bowls are wonderful. There are kid-specific items on the menu too. Other menu items include sandwiches, salads, soups and pastas. Full menu online at www.curiocafe. net. The decor is simple, comfortable and earthy with hand painted chairs and tables.

Minor issues include need for better ventilation as the kitchen is close to the dining

area we walked away smelling like breakfast for a while and the fan in the bathroom was so loud it conveniently scared the you know what out of the boys when they had to go. For such a kid oriented place a step stool would be welcome in the bathroom. It's also quickly becoming popular for weekend breakfast, so don't be surprised if there's a minor wait at prime time. Claudia & Lucy (the owners) do a good job of hustling, so tables turn pretty quickly though.

Upcoming Events...The City of Chicago will be hosting a Winter Preparedness Fair on

Saturday, January 12, 2008. It will be held at **North Park Village** in the Administration Building from **9:00 am** – **2:00 p.m.** This fair is free of charge, and those attending will receive a free home weatherization kit (while supplies last). This is a great opportunity to learn how to reduce your heating bill and about financial assistance programs for utility bills and home weatherization. In the meantime, everyone can reduce the amount of natural gas they use by taking a few simple and affordable steps provided by Peoples Energy:

- Keep your thermostat between 65 and 70 degrees. When you go to sleep or leave the house, turn your thermostat down.
- Open your blinds or drapes to let the sun in on sunny winter days. At night, close them to help insulate your windows from the cold.
- Don't heat spaces or rooms that you don't use. Close the vents and shut the doors for these rooms. By minimizing the space you actually heat, can save you a significant amount on your heating bill.
- Warm air rises. Direct your heating vents so that they blow horizontally across the floor instead of up toward the ceiling. If you have ceiling fans, in the summer set them so that you feel a breeze coming down (usually counterclockwise). In the winter, reverse the fan's direction and set it at a low speed to bring the heated air back down from the ceiling where you need it.


CAPS Report

The November meeting was held on a cold and rainy night - the night before Thanksgiving (Nov 21st). So, the meeting was atypical, lasting only 30 minutes with very few people in attendance and no special presentations.

Officers gave updates on several issues that were brought up last month CAPS meeting.

- Residents had reported people hanging out in an abandoned building on Irving Park and Central Park. The officers reported checking the location. It is a building under renovation and it seems the rear gate was often left open. The police department contacted the owners and locks have been added to the gates.
- Residents had reported the business, MJ Food & Liquor, on 3654 West Lawrence was selling to minors. The officers reported Vice checking into the situation. They utilized a minor to try and purchase liquor. The minor was unable to make a purchase. Vice will continue to monitor the establishment.

Under new issues discussed, there was a report by one resident that there may be a prostitute working on Lawrence from Pulaski to the River. Officers stated they will investigate.
