Christmas Tree Recycling in Select City Parks Jan. 9 through 23rd

There's something undeniably romantic about a real Christmas tree. The scent, the falling needles, the way they light up our homes, infuse the air with merriment for a few short weeks then away they go. But where do they go?

We have a choice: send them to the landfill, or let them become mulch that will enrich and protect the soil at Chicago's beloved parks and forests.

If you decide on the mulch option, then Chicago's Christmas Tree Recycling program is for you. Turning your tree into mulch benefits the earth by making the soil friendlier for new trees to grow. It also reduces waste going to landfill.

Chicago's 2021 Tree Recycling Program runs from January 9th through the 23rd at dozens of parks across the City. Only live or natural trees without flocking are accepted (no garland or wreaths). Because the trees are mulched, all tinsel, ornaments, lights, and stands must be removed. Plastic bags used for transport should also be removed before putting trees in the stalls.

Twenty-five parks citywide are hosting Tree Recycling events this year. Trees can be dropped off anytime during normal business hours. Some

Is Now a Good Time to Sell?

CAPS Report

Beats 1722 & 1723 - Zoom Meeting, December 16, 2020

In Attendance: CAPS Officer Daryl Boon, Commander Pontecore, Ald. Rodriguez's staff (33rd), Erika Wozniak from Ald. Nugent's office (39th), Jessica from Ald. Rosa's staff (35th), Rep. Andrade and staff.

Officer Boon reported year over year crime statistics for the 17th District. The total number of homicides has more than doubled with 11 year-to-date compared to 5 one year ago. Shootings have increased 55% to 62 this year compared with 28 last year. Robberies total 219 year-to-date compared with 157 in 2019. Burglaries are down 30% year over year, as well as motor vehicle thefts which are down 6%.

Officer Boon talked about an aggravated assault, carjacking, car fire and reports of shots fired in Beat 1722. For Beat 1723, the shooting victim in a mid-day shooting near the McDonald's at Elston & Irving was a career gang member. Officer Boon and Commander Pontecore also discussed the area around Lawndale and Agatite where there were 3 shootings in one week. Thanks to some

video from a Nest camera, Tac and Beat officers went into an apartment in that vicinity and identified 7 gang members, a large cache of drugs and shell casings in the apartment. Alderman Rosa, Commander Pontecore and multiple agencies are working on eviction notices of the gang members and addressing the troubled building.

The Tactical Team has launched a burglary assessment initiative. Officers will come to your home and evaluate the strong and weak points of the exterior of your home in terms of what burglars look for. To arrange a visit, email the CAPS office or call 312.742.4822. Availability is limited.

There has been an increase in the number of carjackings in the area and city-wide. Residents are advised to give up the car without fighting back. If there are children in the car, the advice is to yell "I have kids in the car." Carjackers do not want to steal a vehicle that is known to have children inside, according to the police. As the cold weather sets in, residents are advised not to leave an unattended car running.

In the prior month, 6 individuals were taken off the streets, resulting in a lull in violence in Beat 1723.

Chicago Connected

Did you know that eligible CPS students can get up to four years of internet service at no cost through Chicago Connected?

Visit <u>cps.edu/getconnected</u> to check if you are eligible. Eligibility parameters for Chicago Connected is constantly expanding. If you were previously ineligible, it is suggested that you recheck again.

Once eligible, you will be given a code by CPS, and you can sign up by calling the designated Chicago Connected line for Comcast and RCN:

RCN: Call 312-955-2400

Important Things to Note

Signing up for Chicago Connected requires a form of ID, a code from CPS, and an address. A Social Security Number is not required - over 30 different forms of ID are accepted.

Students in temporary living situations and other extenuating circumstances can request a hotspot by calling their principal. An address is not required.

Additional questions about Chicago Connected can be answered on their FAQ page, which is constantly being updated.

New City Laws Coming Into Effect in 2021

Accessory Dwelling Unit Legalization

Starting May 1, 2021, Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) will be legalized in five areas around the city, increasing access to safe, affordable housing for thousands of Chicagoans. Under this new program, attics, basements and coach houses will be lawfully permitted in these zones and the Department of Housing will launch a three-year evaluation period to report on ADU activities and make recommendations for a permanent citywide policy. These areas in the Northwest zone include: parts of the Albany Park, Irving Park, Avondale, Hermosa, Logan Square, West Town, Near West Side, and East Garfield Park community areas.

Minimum Wage

On July 1, 2021, Chicago's minimum wage will increase to \$15 an hour at large businesses and \$14.50 an hour for workers at businesses with 20 or fewer employees.

Irving Park Community Food Pantry

Pantry Changes Registration System

In conjunction with the Greater Chicago Food Depository, the Irving Park Community Food Pantry in January introduced a new registration system for clients in our service area of 60641 and 60618 ZIP codes.

The system, Link2Feed, requires additional demographic information about people in the household. It asks basic information about race, age and housing status and does not ask about citizenship. No one will be disqualified from receiving food by their responses.

The form asks for email contacts so we can communicate better with clients about key information, such as weather closings or changes to procedures. The demographic information will provide details that will help the Pantry apply for a wider range of grants that require such data, giving us access to more food and funding opportunities.

The enrollment forms are networked throughout the GCFD's pantries, so clients need to enroll only once no matter which pantry they first visit.

All clients will have to provide this information prior to receiving their food during their first visit to the Pantry in 2021. To speed this process, clients can go online to the GCFD enrollment page at https://gcfd.link2feed.com/ They also can click on this QR code to get to the site:



You can download a free QR Reader for any smart phone.

Thank you to everyone who supported our "virtual" Holiday Meal and Holiday Gift programs in December. They provided our clients with the makings of a holiday dinner and each child up to 12 years old with a stocking of gifts. The program gave out 374 stockings, with the few remaining donated to Sherwood Elementary School in Englewood, with the help of Principal Alice Buzanis.

Trees must be bare, no ornaments, lights or garland. Due to Covid, curbside only. Visit dtr-recycling.org/order-a-tree-pickup and complete their form to send a request for your tree pickup. Cost is \$20-25, depending on tree size.

In order to be most efficient, they try to pick up from certain neighborhoods on scheduled days. If you require a pickup on a different day for your neighborhood you should contact them directly. We prefer online payment through credit/debit or PayPal, but we also accept check and cash payments when appropriate.

St. Viator and St. Wenceslaus to Consolidate

The Archdiocese of Chicago announced more church and school consolidations due to declining attendance, rising financial costs and the decreasing number of priests. These consolidations are part of the Archdiocese of Chicago's Renew My Church plan that will determine the future of 344 parishes across the Chicago area. More closures are expected to come. The decision comes after several months of "feedback and discernment" by teams made up of representatives from each parish and school.

On the Northwest Side, St. Bartholomew Church, Our Lady of Victory and St. Pascal Catholic Church will come together for two Sunday services at either St. Bartholomew Church, 3601 N. Lavergne Ave., or at St. Pascal, 3935 N. Melvina. Our Lady of Victory will close next year.

In Old Irving and Avondale, **St. Viator Catholic Church**, 4170 W. Addison St., and **St. Wenceslaus Roman Catholic Church**, 3400 N. Monticello Ave., will become a new parish with two worship sites.

Most of the changes announced Friday are expected to happen by July 1, 2021. Five of the schools will either be grouped together or administratively governed by the archdiocese rather than a single parish. Visit renewmychurch.org to see how other churches and schools will be grouped.

Also on July 1, the minimum wage for tipped workers will increase to \$9.00 an hour, with employees required to make up the difference if base wage plus tips do not equal \$15.00 an hour.

Parking Meter Rates

Parking meter rates for the \$2 per hour zone will increase by a quarter to \$2.25 per hour on January 2. Rates in the \$4.50 and \$7.00 zone remain unchanged. The City will begin to generate revenues off the parking meter contract for the first time since its inception.

Shared Housing Reforms

A series of new regulatory measures will come into effect on April 1, 2021 that will require Chicagoans that use platforms like Airbnb or HomeAway among others to rent their residential units will now need to apply directly with the Department of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection and pay a new \$125 registration fee.

Extension of Business Relief

The City has moved to give further relief to businesses by extending critical relief efforts and renewal dates into 2021. As a part of these measures, all existing Sidewalk Cafes will be now be able to operate until May 1, 2021 without needing to renew or pay a renewal fee. Additionally, all business and public vehicle licenses with an expiration date between March 15, 2020 and June 15, 2021 will be considered active and will not need to pay a renewal fee until July 15, 2021. Licensees will have until July 15, 2021 to renew without paying a late fee.

Vehicle Fuel Tax and Cloud Tax

In order close an historic \$1.2 billion deficit, the City's 2021 pandemic budget relied on a number of revenue sources and cost savings designed to minimize the burden on any single business sector or resident. Among those will be a series of modest increases in taxes and fees that come into effect on January 1, 2021. This includes an increase in the Vehicle Fuel Tax by \$0.03 per gallon on non-aviation purchases. To fill up a 12-gallon gas tank, motorists will see an increase of approximately \$0.36. Additionally, there will be a 1.75 percentage point increase to the cloud tax which is applied to computer leases of cloud software and cloud infrastructure. This tax aligns with the tax imposed on all other lease, rental or use of rented, personal property currently taxed at 9 percent.

However, this month, all 6 individuals are back on the streets on electronic monitoring, which officers don't think is effective.

The representative from Alderman Rodriguez's office (33rd) stated that an outreach program called ALSO has started and is working.

Call 911 to report suspicious activity or individuals in your neighborhood and provide detailed descriptions of the individuals and vehicles involved in any incident. Even if a neighbor has already reported the incident or activity, other neighbors should make separate calls. The police often look at the number of calls for service in determining the allocation of officers and resources with respect to a particular situation or incident. The next meeting will be on January 20th at 6:30 p.m. via Zoom. Email CAPS.017district@chicagopolice.org for an invitation. Remember to always lock your vehicle, never leave it running unattended and be on the lookout for scams involving Covid-19 cures and scams related to income tax refunds. Remember, the IRS will never call you on the phone.
