Independence Branch Library Community Meeting May 15.

A public meeting to gather community input on the final design will be on Monday, May 15, from 6-8 pm at Murphy Elementary School on 3539 W. Grace. Construction on the new Independence Branch Library at 4022 N. Elston is slated to begin later this year, with completion anticipated by winter of 2018.

The design includes a library on the ground level with affordable housing above as part of a unique agreement between the Chicago Housing Authority and the Chicago Public Library for a mixed-use development at the site. John Ronan Architects, the only Chicago finalist for the Obama Library, won a design contest to create the project.

This will likely be the only opportunity for community input on a project which will become a cornerstone for the West Walker Neighborhood. Please attend to have your voice heard!

The last West Walker Community Meeting this Spring is Tuesday, May 16. This will be our final meeting before the summer break. For those unable to attend the Independence Branch Library meeting on May 15, we will provide a snapshot of the meeting and will direct any additional input toward the library planning concerns. Any other community issues can be addressed as well.

The 32nd Annual West Walker Civic Association Garage and Yard Sale is May 20th! Even though spring is taking its time to arrive, there is one sure sign that it is around the corner, and that's the annual West Walker Civic Association Garage and Yard Sale. 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CAPS Report

Beat 1722 & 1723 Beat Meeting, April 19, 2017

Present: CAPS Officer Veronica Meraz. Beat Facilitator Martha Hack, Monica Trevino, 35th Ward Office (Alderman Rosa), Beat Officers.

A resident asked if an update was available about drug dealing in the vicinity of Montrose and Ridgeway, which was reported at the March CAPS meeting. CAPS Officer Meraz stated she would follow up. A resident also inquired about drug dealing occurring in the alley behind the 4100 block of Avers. Officer Meraz will follow up. Residents are encouraged to call 911 any time they see suspicious activity or drug dealing.

The information packet that is distributed at the CAPS meetings has been shortened to include violent crimes only.

Someone asked whether Chicago Police are responsible for shootings on expressways. Shootings on Chicago's expressways are the responsibility of the Illinois State Police.

CAPS Officer Meraz reported that there is an ongoing investigation of the sexual assault that occurred in the

4600 block of N. Monticello on April 1st. She reported that there is no one in custody.

As always, call 911 to report suspicious activity or individuals in your neighborhood and provide detailed descriptions of the individuals and vehicles involved in any incident. Even if a neighbor has already reported the incident or activity, other neighbors should make separate calls. The police often look at the number of calls for service in determining the allocation of officers and resources with respect to a particular situation or incident. CAPS meetings for our beat are currently held monthly at the 17th District Police Station, 4650 N. Pulaski, in the Community Room. Meetings begin at 7:30 p.m. on the third Wednesday of the month and typically last one hour. The next regularly scheduled meeting for Beat 1723 is Wednesday, May 17, 2017. If you or a neighbor have been the victim of a crime and you would like to share that information with your neighbors, e-mail the details to westwalkercrimealerts@gmail.com. Prom Problems and Probable Cause

It is just a fact of life that coming of age is fraught with peril. As the adults in their life we help our children by being clear about our expectations, the possible penalties of their conduct and by being there for them when they fail. Teens don't realize they have a long life ahead of them and their career goals might be limited by their conduct now. Future employers only access available arrest records but employers for more sensitive positions, like police officers, firefighters, doctors, lawyers and military service have almost unlimited access to records that we thought were removed. This is the first installment of a 3-part article on the problems our teens encounter.

Part 1: Youth and Alcohol

Summer is nearly upon us and that means proms, graduations and warm summer nights at the lake. It seems that the whenever teens and young adults get together their ability to make the right choices is seriously diminished.

Parties are synonymous with alcohol and Illinois is a strict parent to our drinking minors. Unlike in criminal cases a "minor" when it comes to alcohol use, is any person under 21 years of age. Some of the possible scenarios and penalties are as follows:

Fake ID? Using someone else's ID, altering an official state ID, all these tricks are a misdemeanor offense. And if your child hooked up with a real criminal mastermind who is manufacturing ID's, possession is a Class 4 Felony and includes suspension of your driver's license.

Parents hosting a party where the under 21 set drink? Parents get a minimum \$500 fine. If one of those kids gets injured or dies, you are facing a Class 4 felony.

Illinois law prohibits the consumption or possession of alcoholic liquor by any person under 21 years of age, which is a Class A Misdemeanor. The person under 21 years of age is subject to a minimum \$500.00 fine. And the penalty is enhanced for transporting alcohol. Open alcohol in a car? Everyone can be charged with the same beverage, even if they did not touch the drink. Expect a minimum one year driver's license suspension for the first offense.

Finally, if your child is driving with ANY amount of alcohol in their system there is a minimum 3-month driver's license suspension, 6 months if they refuse testing. A driver's record cannot ever be expunged.

Carlson's After-School Program Partners with Mentors from Schurz High School



Adult mentors from Schurz High School's buildOn program joined their teen mentors at Carlson Community Services' after-school program for a carnival in April.

Carlson Community Services' Magic After-School Place (MAP) is brimming with activity and energy every afternoon. Fifty children from Murphy and Belding schools are enrolled in MAP, an after-school program which provides neighborhood working parents with affordable after-school care.

A critical component of the MAP program is our mentoring partnership with Schurz High School's buildOn program. MAP is buildOn's longest running project at Schurz (almost 5 years!). Between buildOn and NHS/buildOn, a total of 86 unique high school mentors have volunteered at MAP this school year.

MAP mentors assist with homework, provide one-on-one tutoring and lead clubs. In addition to earning service hours, the mentors gain leadership skills, confidence and a sense of purpose in providing a needed service. By the end of the school year, we anticipate mentors will have logged over 1,000 hours.

"I think buildOn students love volunteering at MAP because they get to form one-on-one bonds with younger students and build strong relationships," said Jessie Schwartz, buildOn's service learning program manager. "They look forward to seeing the MAP students and appreciated how excited the kids are to have them there."

BuildOn is an international nonprofit organization that runs youth service after-school programs in United States high schools, and builds schools in developing countries. Schurz graduate Charlie Caneda was a MAP mentor through buildOn and now is on the MAP staff. Eventually we hope to have MAP students return to us as mentors!



Keeler, grows basil, chives, cilantro, mint, oregano, parsley, rosemary and thyme. We appreciate all donations of herbs and gardening materials or tools. We harvest the herbs each week and include them in our food distributions.

Two Schurz Teachers Receive Prestigious Summer Fellowships

Two Schurz High school teachers, Mircea (Mitch)

Arsenie and Christine Salerno are representing Schurz and Chicago Public Schools this summer in prestigious fellowships through the Lindblad Expeditions/National Geographic Grosvenor Teacher Fellowship and Fulbright-Hays Group Projects Abroad "Teaching the Andes" Program, respectively.

Mr. Arsenie and the rest of the 11th annual class of Grosvenor Teaching Fellows will embark on a global expedition this summer aboard one of the Lindblad expedition ships "in pursuit of enhancing their geographic knowledge with hands-on field experience they will bring back to their classrooms and professional communities." Mr. Arsenie specifically will be going on a two-week circumnavigation of Iceland aboard the National Geographic Explorer.

An environmental systems and societies teacher in the International Baccalaureate program as well as the AP environmental science teacher, Mr. Arsenie also coaches a successful Academic Decathlon team here at Schurz High School. A firm believer in experiential learning and using technology to empower students, he promotes a global perspective and environmental sensitivity by bringing students outdoors and inspiring them to never stop asking questions.

The Fulbright-Hays Teaching the Andes program in which Ms. Salerno, an International Baccalaureate Spanish teacher and former varsity softball coach, will be participating includes a two-week stay in Peru and a two-week stay in Ecuador where teachers will learn about Andean culture through a pedagogic lens. The goal of this month-long program is to create innovative curriculum that supports hands-on learning opportunities for students in urban districts. Twelve teachers from across the country will learn how to speak Quechua, an indigenous language spoken in Peru and Ecuador, in an attempt to create unity between indigenous and urban populations.

Upon her return in July, Ms. Salerno will create a new hands-on curriculum that promotes interest in this region of the world. "I hope to expand my knowledge of Andean language and culture in order to create

international-minded students who respect differences in our world," said Salerno.

Schurz High School is honored to share these talented educators with the world and looking forward to learning through the experiences that they bring back from abroad!

Public Artwork Meeting for Addison and Irving Park Blue Line Stations June 12

The community is invited to attend a public meeting to provide input on the design of new public artwork at the Addison and Irving Park Blue Line stations on Monday, June 12, from 6:00-7:30 pm at the Independence

Park Field House, 3945 N. Springfield Avenue.

Francesco Simeti was selected by the Chicago Transit Board to create a site-specific installation at the Addison Blue Line station. He is known for creating thought provoking imagery using wallpapers, sculptures, and 3D collage. His work has been featured both nationally and internationally - including in Brooklyn, London, Milan, Finland, Rome, and more.

Dan Devening was selected to create the artwork installation at the Irving Park Line station. Devening is a curator, artist, and Adjunct Professor of painting at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Since the mid 1980's, his paintings and works on paper have been featured nationally and internationally.

The installation of the new artwork at both stations will add value to the station, community, and enhance the experience of daily commuters. The anticipated installation date is 18 months from the community meeting. I hope you will join me in providing input to guide the direction of both of these projects.




