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CAPS Report

Beat 1723, November 16th, 2011

The corner of Monticello and Belle Plaine and the immediate surrounding area continue to be an issue with respect to reported criminal activity. Among other things, there were reports of multiple instances of shots fired, suspected drug dealing and gang activity. The 17th District Police held an outdoor roll call for Beat 1723 on October 28th. Two arrests have been made and the police continue to monitor the situation.

In the 3800 block of West Irving Park, there have been reports of drug and gang activity. Two officers were specially assigned to this issue and two arrests have been made in connection with the problem property.

In the 4100 block of Lawndale, there have been reports of gang and criminal activity. Progress is being made with respect to a particular building and police continue to monitor the situation.

Commander Melissa Staples reported that 96 arrests have been made and over 250 contact cards have been written in Beat 1723 during the period of October 1 to November 16, 2011.

Garage break-ins, thefts and burglaries are continuing issues in West Walker. Please make every effort to secure your property.

The Commander stressed that if you see suspicious activity or if something seems out of place, call 911 immediately so that police may respond to an incident in progress. If you do not want to provide your name, state that you wish to remain anonymous when you begin speaking to the 911 operator. For incidents which are no longer in progress, remember that rather than calling 911, you may call 311 to have a police officer complete a report for incidents such as theft, criminal damage to property, lost property and other non-emergency situations. Even if a neighbor has already reported an incident or activity that affects a group of neighbors, other neighbors should make separate calls. The more calls received by police with respect to a particular situation, the more of a priority it becomes.

CAPS meetings for our beat are currently held monthly at the 17th District Police Station, 4650 N. Pulaski, in the Community Room. Meetings begin at 7 p.m. on the third Wednesday of the month and typically last one hour. PLEASE NOTE - NO MEETING WILL BE HELD IN **DECEMBER**, 2011. The next regularly scheduled meeting for Beat 1723 is Wednesday, January 18, 2012.

Dear Friends:

I hope you have the opportunity to take advantage of all that Chicago offers during the holidays. Whether taking in the lights on Michigan Avenue, caroling at Millennium Park, or strolling through Christkindlmarket at Daley Plaza, there is no place like Chicago, especially this time of year.

Holiday lights, if installed and used safely, can transform our neighborhoods into a winter wonderland. If used incorrectly, lights can lead to fire.

The Chicago Fire Department asked me to pass along the following tips to avoid fires this holiday season:

- Avoid overloading extension cords or light strings.
- There should be no more than three sets of lights on an extension cord.
- Do not connect large light sets through miniature light sets.
- Never use an open flame near a real or an artificial tree.

 Candles should be held firmly by non-flammable holders. Do not leave unattended. Keep candles away from flammable materials and out of the reach of children.

I'm sure that most people have working smoke detectors in their homes. Are you aware that you should replace the smoke detectors every ten years? I have a limited number of free smoke detectors available to seniors 65 and older. If you're a senior in doubt about the age of your smoke detector, please stop by my Ward Office (4404 W. Lawrence) and pick up a free detector.

News from Seanachai Theater

It is early December. Our days are shorter. Our nights are longer. We are spending more time indoors, and we are looking for something fun to do when the sun sets. Our ancestors used this time to gather around fireplaces with hot cups of warm beverages to entertain themselves with storytelling. We still do that today, and it is still fun.

If you are looking for something fun to do with friends this month, gather them together in the third floor theatre of the Irish-American Heritage Center to enjoy a well-told story by Conor McPherson, one of the hottest voices in theatre today all over the world. *St. Nicholas* is a one-man play written in 1997 before McPherson became famous. Like a lot of his plays, *St. Nicholas* touches on the supernatural; and is it not always fun to be told a scary story in the dark? Especially in winter.

Even if vampires taunt the main character, an acerbic Dublin theatre critic and a man without a soul, this is not a horror tale with scary macabre effects. *St. Nicholas* is better described as a psychological drama – the story of a man's odyssey of soul as he winds his way through different tribes of people that make up his life: his family, other journalists, actors and directors, other critics, and yes, the tribe of vampires he begins to work for. What happens to him, what he learns, and how he might or might not change is worth telling.

Those of you who enjoyed Conor McPherson's play, *The Weir*, know how entertaining was its campfire-like quality of hearing a group of characters tell stories in the dark. Matt Miller, director of *The Weir*, is also the director of *St. Nicholas*. Matt is a stage director, acting teacher, and associate casting director with Paskal Rudnicke. Currently, he is staging the world premiere of Carly Mensch's *Oblivion* for Steppenwolf's First Look Repertory.

One-man plays are most enthralling when that one man is a fine actor with excellent storytelling skills. Get ready to be enthralled because the actor in this play is Steve Pickering, a renowned Chicago actor who has appeared in over 30 productions for Chicago's Goodman Theatre since 1987 including The Seagull, King Lear, Long Days Journey into Night, and Death of A Salesman.

This Production of Conor McPherson's **St. Nicholas**, directed by Matthew Miller and performed by Steve Pickering will Benefit Seanachai Theatre Company and Shanghai Low Theatricals in the Seanachai Space. Seanachai is located on the 3rd Floor of the Irish-American Heritage Center, 4626 N Knox in Chicago.

Show runs December 1–18th; Thursdays, Friday, Sundays at 8:00 p.m., Saturdays at 5:00 p.m. and at 8:00 p.m. Preview Tickets for December 1 and 2 are \$10. Help Neighbors Enjoy a Happier Holiday!

Our neighbors in need will enjoy a happier holiday season with your help, by contributing money or food for the Irving Park Community Food Pantry's annual holiday distribution on December 21st.

We especially need

donations of juice, stuffing, cranberry sauce, canned yams and vegetables, instant potatoes, cake mixes and pumpkin-pie filling. Even more, monetary donations are particularly helpful to supplement donations and allow us to provide gift certificates so our largest families can buy a turkey to complete their meal.
